Response to a suggestion received by one of our callers:

Today's Topic:

"Why is God doing this?"

For starters, I don't think He is doing it (I should have stated that more clearly in the broadcast), but we have no way of knowing for sure what is in His mind, except for His passionate, sacrificial love for us.

I also didn't mention these two points which might be helpful:

Sin is the ultimate cause of it all. God isn't responsible for sin. However, He has provided an eternal remedy for it in Jesus.

God intervened in human history to address our greatest need – sin. He has chosen not to intervene every day and to orchestrate every minute of our lives. He allows us to make decisions and choices of our own. He also gives others that same freedom. Sometimes their choices negatively impact us, in the same way that our choices sometimes negatively impact others.

I did mention the following:

We tend to think of all suffering as being bad, because it is never pleasant. Sometimes, though, suffering can bring about beneficial results. (Kind of a "no pain, no gain" type of thing.)

The better question than "Why is God doing this?" is "How can God use this?" We can't know IF He's doing it or why He's allowing it, but we can see how He is using this calamity:

- He is giving us incredible opportunities to serve;
- to help us review our priorities;
- to help us practice patience in the face of hardship and disappointment;
- to increase our time spent in prayer.

I spend more time talking about these things in the sermon already recorded for the weekend services.

At the end of the video update, I read and offered a few thoughts on a Bible passage. Here's that passage:

2 Corinthians 12:7-10

A thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me. . . . Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong.
